Hello from the New Interim Moderator,

My name's Rev Ian Cathcart – Minister in Flemington Hallside Parish Church – one wife and four twenty-something children (Hannah will be 20 in November)!

I really love the front cover graphic in the magazine this month. It seems to me to sum up so much about what true freedom should be about. I know it's obvious but it does seem to picture that sense of being set free. Freedom is one of those things that we know we're supposed to have because we are a Christian. We are, after all, supposed to know the truth and so the truth will set us free. But various things rob us of that freedom – Presbytery Plans for example! Personally getting the wisdom to ensure we live 'out of' the freedom that is already our Easter gift should be a goal.

Some pals suggested some books to help. One book recommended to me was a book called *The Way* of *Transition* by William Bridges. It's a memoir of an American management consultant who worked with US west coast multi-national companies, principally through the 80's and 90's. It was not the kind of book or, moreover, the kind of author I would have sought out personally. But I was purposefully trying to be more open to writers I wouldn't usually read – Bridges wasn't even a Christian. But Bridges' was *thee* man for getting big business to genuinely address and deal with changed commercial circumstances. He was paid hundreds of thousands of dollars by world-renown companies and then this really awful thing happened: his wife got cancer and died within two years. Just in case you feel I've spoiled the book for you – that's how the book opens.

The initial stages of the book focus on this man's loss of trust in his own consultancy – the companies who were paying him well for his management insights still wanted him to help them. The problem was he began to doubt the power of his insights. He had helped countless companies both directly and through his writing, but now he began to question what he was teaching because of his own changed circumstances. He had told companies they had to be honest about difficulties and face up to change and now he felt the inadequacy of his own advice when he couldn't face up to the death of his own wife.

In the hands of a less-honest or less-eloquent writer that might have meant this book would just have been a misery-memoir. But it's the honesty Bridges' brings to the proceedings, as well as the insights from psychology, management experience and ... dare I say ... spirituality that separate this book from the many other self-help books that fill the bookshop shelves.

Ordinarily, I would warn people away from this kind of book – it's clearly not a Christian book. Worse than that, it feels sufficiently 'spiritual' that it might fool you into thinking it actually is Christian. Bridges quotes from the Gospels, from the Old and New Testaments as well as Christian authors. The point, however, is that he'll also extensively quote from the Koran and various Hindu gurus. Above all else he very much likes the insights from various coming of age rituals from Amazonian forest tribes or Borneo villagers or the Australian Outback Aborigines. In my defence, there's no actual teaching principle that is a bonafide non-Christian teaching. Every guru and 'ethnic' quote could just as easily have been backed-up with a quote from Christ or from the New Testament. Let me finish with one point that I found particularly helpful; Bridges returns to this point frequently but only because we so rarely get it right. Early on in the book he makes a key differentiation between the definitions of two words people usually use interchangeably: change and transition.

Change he says, happens sometimes by our actions; and sometimes by the way life unfolds. The point is change *always* happens. Transition, however, only happens within us when we choose to embrace the changes and learn from them – even when they're difficult.

He observed that companies so often make changes (as do people) when what they really do is make a transition in how they deal with the new situation. How you transition to cope with the difficulties in life – be you a company or person – determines whether you learn from the changes in life or just keep repeating them.

When you accept that God really *is* in charge and the difficulties are there that we might be better used to build the Kingdom then we begin to have the real freedom the Bible speaks about – even during a Presbytery Planning process.



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Now that Malcolm has retired and is moving out of the area, where does that leave us on a Sunday morning at West and Wardlawhill Church? Fortunately, we have a worship team who are willing, and able, to take the service each week.

The team consists of Stuart Harbinson, Megan Ross, Sheena Kerr, and a good number of bible readers. Rev Eddie Mubengo has also offered to take the occasional service with Stuart filling in at his church in Carntyne and Cranhill Parish Church. Tamsin Munro, trainee minister, is also keen to be involved before her next placement with the Naval Chaplaincy in Portsmouth in July. Since asking for volunteers in mid-April, I have had two people coming forward but there's always room for a few more volunteers, willing to lead a prayer or even participate in a sermon, or reflection.

Looking further ahead, as you recall from previous church magazines, Glasgow Presbytery is going through a major re-planning process just now. We are working in a cluster comprising Fernhill & Cathkin Church, Rutherglen Old Parish Church, Bridgeton St Francis in the East Church, and Rutherglen West & Wardlawhill Church. The eventual outcome of the Glasgow Presbytery plan, as directed by the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh, is to reduce the number of ministers and buildings in our cluster. For our cluster, we were initially allocated 1.5 ministerial posts and 0.5 priority area posts. Glasgow Presbytery has since increased our priority area post to 1.0, which has been assigned to Church House in Bridgeton, located next to Bridgeton St Francis in the East Church.

The Glasgow Presbytery plan has been accepted by both our Kirk Session and Congregational Board but has still to be submitted by Glasgow Presbytery for acceptance in Edinburgh.

To achieve this reduction in ministers' posts and buildings, some adjustments are necessary. These include a possible union between Rutherglen West & Wardlawhill and Fernhill & Cathkin Churches and a possible union of Rutherglen Old and Bridgeton St Francis in the East Churches. This would be followed by a union of all four churches and the disposal of any buildings deemed surplus.

It's going to be a busy time for Rev Ian Cathcart (Interim Moderator), Kim Jackson, Tom McEwan and myself who are representing West and Wardlawhill Church at the cluster group meetings.

Our Daily Bread - Items from their Spring 2023 newsletter

THE ONLY BODY JESUS HAS ON EARTH

"Our vision is to see people of all nations experiencing a personal relationship with Christ, growing to be more like Him and *serving in a local body of His family*."

The mother put her little girl to bed as the day came to its end. But the night had grown very dark already, and the girl was suddenly afraid of being left alone. Her mum gently hushed her, sang a lullaby and promised her that God would watch over her all night long.

A few minutes later, the girl began to cry. When her mum returned, she sobbed, 'Mummy, I'm scared. I want someone here I can see.'

We're all like that young child at times. In our loneliness and suffering, Christ doesn't condemn us for wanting 'someone we can see' to be with us and to care for us. That is why He has made His people part of His body.

In acts 10:38, Peter described our Lord as 'Jesus of Nazareth, He went around doing good'. Those acts of service and kindness were expressed through His earthly body.

But since ascending to heaven, Christ no longer has a body on earth....except ours. He has no hands, legs or feet on earth except for the members of His body, the church.

Later on in Scripture, John wrote, 'No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us' (1 John 4:12). In other words, as we love and care for one another, we reveal the God who cannot be seen, making Him visible to those who long to have 'someone here I can see'.

Part of our vision at Our Daily Bread Ministries is to inspire our readers to be actively involved in a local family of Christ's worldwide body. As Paul explained, 'Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body' (1 Corinthians 12:12-13). Each one of us is needed in this body, just as each one of us needs this body.

Therefore, He sends us out to be His body to one another and to the world, and to go 'around doing good'. Right now, Jesus has no body on earth but ours! Come and reflect with us, then, on two important truths:

Jesus' earthly body is incomplete without you: 'There should be no division in the body, its parts should have equal concern for each other' (1 Corinthians 12:25). We may feel we have little to offer our church family; perhaps we're tempted to stay in the background, out of the way. But God's Word urges us not to let any kind of division creep in. If we are not active in our church family, we are depriving the body of a necessary part for it to function. And, we are depriving ourselves of deeper fellowship with other believers. How might you be active in your part of the body? What aspects of your church's life and mission are you most passionate about? When each of us does our bit, with equal concern for one another, the body moves smoothly without extra strain being placed on any 'joints' or 'muscles'.

There is a part for you to play: 'From Him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work' (Ephesians 4:16).

God has put you in a specific place at a specific time with specific gifts. There are no accidents regarding your circumstances. This means that if we are withholding our gifts or time from our church, some things simply won't be done as well or as powerfully as they could be. For there is work for 'each part' to do. Even if you feel limited in some way or perhaps unable to attend church physically, the Lord calls you an essential and functioning part of His body.

Why not ask your church leader for a weekly prayer list so you can be lifting your brothers and sisters to the Lord? Or could you phone those who are struggling to offer encouragement? These are wonderful and valuable ways to be an active part of the church family, even if your service needs to be done from home.

Prayers for Your Church Family -

A Prayer for Unity:

Lord, I know that conflicts are inevitable in this life. But I also know You command us to live at peace with one another. I pray for healing and reconciliation among my church family where there is conflict and heartache. Help us to put aside our differences and pride, to know instead the powerful bond of unity found in Your Spirit. We are saved by one Gospel, children of one Father and united in one body. Remind us of the joy and privilege of these truths, that we may experience them in our day-to-day fellowship. Amen.

A Prayer for Church Leaders:

Heavenly Father, I lift to you those who lead my church, as pastors, teachers, carers and overseers. Deepen Your love in their hearts, renewing and refreshing their souls for the work ahead. May they draw near to You daily, rejoicing in Scripture and energized by Your wisdom and guidance as they shepherd Your people. Fill them with patience, peace and joy, remembering the Good Shepherd walks beside them, holding them especially close when the work is hard and their hearts are heavy. Bless them in their service, I pray. Amen.

Christian Aid Week: 14-20 May 2023



Donation Envelopes will be handed out by the Welcome Team at the front door of the Church on Sunday, 14th May 2023 and should be returned by 28th May.

A date for your diary - there will be a Christian Aid service on Sunday 14th May at 6.30pm in Stonelaw Church to mark the start of Christian Aid week - this will be an intergenerational cafe style service – with a warm welcome extended to everyone.

Quiz Sheets for C.A. funds are available at a cost of £1 and again to be returned by 28th May 2023.

Christian Aid is not holding the 30,000 steps challenge during the May fundraiser. However, teams from local churches are tackling a slightly easier 150k challenge (that's an average of just under 5k a day). You can take part on foot, you can cover the distance by bike, scooter, wheelchair or any way you like! If you, a member of your family or friend would like to raise funds for Christian Aid in this way, please contact me and I will supply sponsor sheets.

This Christian Aid Week, we share the challenges experienced by communities in Malawi. Covid, climate change, conflict in Ukraine and the cost of living crisis mean that in Malawi, soaring costs of food and essentials are crushing dreams, keeping people in desperate poverty.

But there is hope!

Together with our partners, we empower vulnerable communities to find practical and sustainable ways out of poverty, including giving them the skills to:

- grow crops (like pigeon peas!) that are more resilient to the climate crisis
- restore soil fertility
- increase harvests

• learn business skills

• join cooperatives to earn more for their crops.

For thousands of farming families in Malawi, pigeon peas are a route out of poverty. The mighty pigeon pea is drought resistant, so thrives in the dry fields of southern Malawi. It's an essential part of the diet of millions of people around the world.

Something to think about (Extracted from Christian Aid Readings):

Can you imagine a fruit tree that bears apples, pears, oranges and a host of other fruits from the same one tree? Now that would be amazing. Although there are references to trees like that in heaven, here on earth we have to make do with trees just bearing one type of fruit. However, in the spiritual realm we can be bearers of multiple fruits. And these fruits are attitudes and characteristic traits that are radiated from our lives once the source of these fruits is evident in our lives, and that's the Holy Spirit. When we get the Holy Spirit, we get to bear nine different fruits at the same time. Now that's a good trade off!

Galatians 5:22-23 tells us that the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

Our Christian Aid Week Fundraising will make a huge difference. Please give generously.
